### School

### <u>Autumn Term</u>

The school council voted to support the Tussell Trust for the Harvest festival this year and we collected an excellent amount of food for the food bank. Following our service down at St Peter's Church Mr Jeakins very kindly took our donations for us. During this term we also had a coffee morning in aid of MacMillan which was supported well both by parents and friends of Haresfield.

The children in class 4 had whole class music tuition and made excellent progress learning the ukelele. They gave an end of term performance to the whole school and showed off their talents. We also organised several 'wow' days including programming Lego robots, introduction to coding, a French day and a day learning about their bodies and keeping safe. Many trips took place, going to the Cheltenham Literacy festival, a cinema trip for the whole school, All things wild in Bristol and an Evacuee experience at the steam railway.

The school also took part in many sporting events such as a KS1 football festival, girls football festival, sports hall athletics and KS1 end ball. The children had amazing fun and represented the school impeccably.

Antibullying week in November was on the theme of 'make some noise about bullying' and encouraged children to speak out about bullying wherever they see it and tell an adult if they are being bullied themselves. During the term we had several visits from the Schools Beat Officer PC Hannah Coll who talked to class 4 about peer pressure and online bullying.

We were very fortunate to have the support of our friends from St Peter's to allow us to carry out a workshop for each class in the church called Experience Christmas, where the children had hands on interactive stations telling the real story of Christmas. We also invited all of our school family to Christingle at St Peter's on 19<sup>th</sup> December. The church was full for the event and many ex-pupils, and their families came along to enjoy the evening.

### Spring Term

The children in Class 4 had indoor rowing lesson and attending a rowing festival at Stratford Park. There were several successful rowers at the event including a first for the year 5 girls' team.

The children in years 1 and 2 had whole class recorder lessons, Mrs Bacon was pleasantly surprised how harmonious they sounded and the progress they made was outstanding. They are due to perform for the whole school next term.

The end of term saw worship group run an Easter service for our whole school family, there were readings, artwork and hymns around the theme of justice. During the service we said goodbye to Mrs Alcock Gore who is leaving the school after 16 years of service.

As a school we have been working with a network of other schools, sharing good practice, and attending staff meetings together to share costs of external support. Our small hub of six schools is very successful supporting each other and ensuring the children of our whole community are getting a good education.

The children have been visiting the woodland classroom every Friday this year, until the rain made the area too muddy, and we were conscious that the environment needed time to recover. Each class has a timetabled slot with Mr Meadows, a primary school teacher specialising in Forest School learning. There have been so many different examples of excellent teaching and learning such as den building, wildlife identification, food webs, printing, weaving, clay sculptures, learning about forces and poetry writing to name but a few. I am deeply grateful to the local community for enabling us to use this amazing resource. Teaching children about looking after our environment, taking risks in a safe space and learning about their own limitations allows our school to teach the whole child, allows different children to shine and grow and develops a deep love and respect of nature in our children. Something which I believe is invaluable.
